Philosophy


We believe that children are unique individuals who learn best through creative play.


2009 HIGHLIGHTS

- 57 Children attended preschool (group developmental therapy)
- 40 Children received individual developmental therapy
- 71 Children received 33,070 hours of developmental therapy
- 57 Children were evaluated
 - 16 children received speech therapy evaluations
 - 54 children received occupational therapy evaluations
 - 4 children received physical therapy evaluations
 - 1 Child received an education evaluation
- 39 Children received child care
- 90 children received therapy totaling 6,240 hours
 - 16 Children received physical therapy
 - 88 Children received occupational therapy
 - 49 Children received speech / language therapy
- 158 Children were served by targeted case management
- 606 families and 659 children were served by respite
- 25 new respite providers were trained and certified
- 546 Children received funds for therapeutic recreation


CHILDREN'S CENTER PROGRAMS

- Preschool: Early childhood education informed by the Maine State Infant/Toddler and Preschool Early Learning Guidelines is delivered within inclusive classrooms.
- Child Care: Full time care is provided for children from six weeks through five years old.
- Specialized Instruction: Children with identified special needs receive intensive developmental therapy to address all domains of development.
- Therapy: Highly trained pediatric therapists work with children to improve their speech and language, daily living skills, and fine and gross motor development.
- Targeted Case Management: Families of children with special needs in Kennebec and Somerset Counties are given support within their homes and communities to link them to appropriate resources for their child.
- Parent Education: Educational workshops in Kennebec and Somerset Counties allow parents and caregivers to learn more about topics most relevant to raising a young child with special needs.
- Respite Care Services: Parents and caregivers of children with special needs throughout Central Maine may take a break from their ongoing care-giving responsibilities.
- Therapeutic Recreation: Children with special needs throughout Central Maine participate in community-based recreational activities.
