Executive Director's Report

The Children's Center had a very busy year in 2016, which is clearly reflected in the numbers:

- 19 children in our Autism Program.
- 60 children in our Behavior Support Program.
- 40 children in Child Care.
- 80 children in Occupational Therapy.
- 30 caregivers in Parent Education & Support
- 9 children in Rehabilitative Community Support
- 65 in Special Education Settings •
- 98 children in Speech & Language Therapy
- 235 children in Targeted Case Management

In particular, the number of children participating in our behavior support classrooms increased from 33 to 60 in one year. Most children in these classrooms have signifianxiety and anger, which often result in disruptive and sometimes aggressive behaviors. Our goal is to help those children find healthy outlets for their feelings and learn behaviors that will not harm themselves or others.

Substance use within families, the effects of prenatal drug use, mental health issues, and other challenges, sadly, impact many children in these programs. The increase in numbers reflects the problems children live with every day and perhaps more specifically, shows the increasing impact opioid abuse is having on our communities.

We anticipate 2017 will also be a very busy and exciting year. Our playground renovation will be completed by late summer. In early fall, we're leasing a portable building to allow for the addition of three classroom spaces.

Much of what we do for children and families is not possible without the generous support we receive from our central Maine community. Thanks to all of you that have helped us continue to provide services and support to very special children. We're very grateful.
