Guy

Walking into the Little Sprouts classroom, a visitor is dazzled by a big, bright smile, and greeted by "HA!" and a wave. This is Guy, just before his second birthday.

Guy's story is a story of community support, and everyone working together to help a child reach his greatest potential.

He came to the Children's Center for childcare. The classroom teachers wondered how they could best support his development and his needs. Then 10 months old, Guy was dealing with



a rare birth defect that affects muscle tone and joint development, resulting in severe weakness and significantly delayed motor skill development. He was not

able to even hold his head up, didn't reach or grasp for things, and didn't make eye contact or interact with the adults or children in the classroom. The simple motion of picking him up from the crib seemed to cause him distress.

Realizing that he could benefit from so much more than "just" the child care offered here at the Children's Center, the classroom teachers invited the Center's therapists into a conversation about how Guy's needs could be best served. With the guidance and support of Physical Therapist Deb McSweeney, a plan for

physical and occupational therapy was developed along the medical model. The Center for Community Inclusion helped make services possible when Guy first arrived at the Center.

When that funding was eliminated, the Center continued to provide services, at our own expense, to honor our commitment to Guy and his family that he would be well-served by the Center. *(Your donations help to cover those expenses – Thank you!!)*

Guy is also receiving case management services as well as school-based support services

from our Family Services department.

With intensive services in the year since he's been here at the Center, and the loving support and commitment of his family at home, Guy is making significant progress. Today you see that bedazzling smile as he is sitting in his adaptive stroller, holding his head up for brief periods of time, communicating (with sign language as well as verbalizing), playfully interacting with adults and his classmates, feeding himself, holding and drinking from his own cup – Guy is a testament to community support!

Here's what Mom says: "Guy has bloomed so much in the recent months and I know the care he

receives at the Children's Center has had a tremendous impact on that. The staff there has worked so well with the therapists coming in from other organizations to better support Guy and creating his 'team'. Guy and I are very grateful for everyone at the Children's Center (as well as the therapists coming in). There isn't a better place that he could be. Thank you all so much!!!!"

Guy at two years old has a veritable entourage – in addition to his family, he's got a medical team, a therapy team, an education team, a behavioral support team and the support of his case manager. And he's leading them all, with his smile.

As I write this, Christmas is a few days away. For the past few years, our employees have helped an increasing number of families in need provide a happy holiday for their little ones, this year providing gifts for 17 children whose families would other-

wise not have had the experience of seeing smiles as their kids opened gifts on Christmas morning.

Like many, I find the commercial-



ism that is increasingly part of this season to be somewhat saddening...but seeing the bags and bags of assembled presents in our conference room yesterday reminded me that this time of year also provides opportunities to bring out the best in the human spirit. For every gift, there

has to be a giver...someone who cares enough about others to put them first.

Back to that little tree and five years ago. The base of the tree was still alive. It was perhaps not as attractive as it might be, and some people may have wanted to remove it for that reason, but I decided to let it go and see what happened. I look at it now every day as I drive back and forth to work and home, and realize that I made the right decision. That tree now has two thriving, growing trunks, where it had only one before. True, it may look a little different than its mates out front, but it is beautiful, healthy, and its uniqueness makes it stand out from the crowd.

Not everyone celebrates Christmas, and those who do, celebrate in many different ways. But what I think can bring us all together is the idea that all of us are unique and valuable, not despite our differences, but because of them.
