# **Learnings**



A short while ago, I went to one of the best conferences I have ever attended. It was in Lewiston, and it was on the topic of "Collective Impact".

Trying to summarize eight hours of thought-provoking information is really hard, but in a nutshell, the main idea is that large-scale social change (like building a well-funded, effective early intervention system) requires broad coordination across different sectors (like education, child care, and human services), yet the social sector remains focused on the isolated intervention of individual organizations.

Individually, there are lots of state offices, agencies, and private organizations, but rarely do we truly work together on solving a common problem. At present, I think our biggest problem could be stated: "How do we work together to make sure that every kid shows up for

school ready to learn: living in a safe home, healthy, well-fed, and able to meet the expectations of the kindergarten setting?"

An example of limited coordination: I am an appointee to the Maine Children's Growth Council. Through the work of that group, I have learned that within state government alone there are forty-three different offices or agencies who somehow focus on or have some oversight of early childhood services. In addition, between these state-level agencies, there are thirty different oversight bodies or panels to assure that each is operating in accord with laws and regulations.

I would encourage each of you to share this information within your community. Our elected officials and business leaders need to know that we expect an early intervention system that directs our resources where it can do the most good: in direct

services to kids and families, not in supporting offices. We need a system with one door where families can tell their story once and have their children's needs met comprehensively, not a 'system' with many doors leading down different halls.

Collectively, we could make this happen. It might mean tearing down some walls, simplifying organizational structures, and creating an expectation of cooperation. But we built this thing, and together we could rebuild it.

It can be done, together.

### The people who work at the Children's Center share their stories...

"I have been working at the Children's Center for over 6 years now. I have seen hundreds of families come and go and have been blessed to have helped a large number of those families in some way. I often sit and wonder how those families/children are doing once they leave the 'cocoon' that is the Children's Center. As some of you may know, I have had the unique opportunity of being related to 2 former students - one being Malcolm, my nephew with Autism, and the other being Aliyah, my daughter, who is diagnosed with ADHD and depressive disorder.

For those of you who don't know Malcolm, he started at the Children's Center in 2001, when he was 2 years old. He had severe needs at that time: he would scream for HOURS on end, pound on the windows until his 'Memere' came back, refuse to walk down the hall, dump EVERY bucket of toys out into one pile, and had extremely limited language (he mostly just said, 'digga, digga'). It has been 8 years since he has been a student here and it is incredible how far he has come. He won his race in the regionals at the swimming Special Olympics last summer. He even attends HIGH SCHOOL now!!!! He holds intelligible conversations, he has a great sense of humor, and is a very loving boy (to most people!). I truly and honestly believe he would be NOWHERE near where he is now if it weren't for the Center. The Children's Center changed Malcolm's path in life. I believe he will be a constructive member of society, he will have a job, get married, have a car... I believe all of those things will now be possible for him because of attending this center.



These are the things that I think about when I wake up in the morning and come to work. I try to put any chaos or uncertainties in the back of my mind, put my teacher hat on :), and go into Busy Bees and change a child's path: give them a new perspective, and put a smile on their face. I think 'Because of me, Mike J. will live independently; because of me, Landon will have a job; because of me Lucas will get married!'
